

**REFLECTION: 3rd Sunday of Lent – The** Cleansing. There is nothing like a child's confidence in his or her mother witnessing one of my godchildren bump her chin on the playground. I was amazed by the way she sped to her mother, eyes blinded with tears, and flung herself into the waiting arms. How many of us wish we had the childlike confidence to do the same thing with God when the ups and downs of life knock us around! The end of today's Gospel, however, implies that the reverse is also true: God longs to entrust himself to us, to find a welcome home in our hearts. While many in Jerusalem saw Jesus' signs and believed, something was still amiss, and Jesus "did not trust himself to them." (Jn 2:24) The only explanation given for this by the evangelist, is that Jesus

RESIDENCY IN THE PRESBYTERY

**UPDATE:** Parishioners, I wish to inform those projects such as the Maintenance Presbytery, the where expenditure exceeds \$50,000 requires submission to and approval by the Archbishop. An application expenditure from the Parish involves provision of a brief which includes two or three builders' quotes, tradespersons or suppliers and showing of the source of finance to meet the costing and that the Parish is capable to meet the cost or the debt. Because of the urgency of the matter and to comply to Safeguarding guidelines, the Archbishop's Office granted permission for the project. In lieu of the Parish calling for builder tenders etc. the church Authority offered the assistance for its own Property / Maintenance Office in so much as provide costings. The Property Office draws from their own panel of trades persons to undertake the extensive maintenance of church property. These costings were closely scrutinised by the attendees at the Parish Council meeting. The costings were found to be "on par" to that which would be on the market. It was unanimously passed that the Parish accept the quote. The decision was conveyed to the Church Office and approval was granted. Work is scheduled to begin in the pursing weeks. So please take care and keep a distance to the grounds around the church and presbytery. In the interim the Priest and Parish Secretary will be relocated to the Parish Meeting Room. "could tell what a man had in him." (Jn 2:25) Just as the forecourt of the Temple had become so cluttered by the merchants and money changers that it looked more like a market than like the Father's house, so too, the human heart. The first reading reminds us of ten basic attitudes which clutter our hearts and even can make them inhospitable God: idolatry, to irreverence, workaholism and its Siamese twin, sloth, ingratitude, hatred, lust, greed, deceit, envy. But lest we be tempted to despair, knowing our habitual struggles and weaknesses, the second reading reminds us of the remedy: not a "miracle cure" or a "wise" self help strategy, but the crucified Christ - the Power and wisdom of God "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that all who believe in him might have eternal life" (Jn 3:16). Therefore, we can be confident that he is not scandalized by our marketplace hearts, but rather is just waiting for us to invite him in. At the last supper, Jesus promised: "If anyone loves me, he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we shall come to him and make our home with him" (Jn 14:23) "Homemaking is a messy business and when Jesus starts flipping the tables of our treasured grudges, daydreams and expectations, the feathers will fly, to say the least. We might want to complain, like the people in the Gospel that "it has taken forty-six years to build this sanctuary!" But his resurrection is the proof that whatever our dreams may be, they are nothing compared with his dream for us. The same Spirit that raised Jesus from the dead desires to live and work in us. (Rm 8:11) May the Holy Trinity find a welcome home in your heart this

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GOSPEL

In 2: 13-25

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up.

Just before the Jewish Passover Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and in the Temple he found people selling cattle and sheep and pigeons, and the money changers sitting at their counters there. Making a whip out of some cord, he drove them all out of the Temple, cattle and sheep as well, scattered the money changers' coins, knocked their tables over and said to the pigeon-sellers, 'Take all this out of here and stop turning my Father's house into a market.' Then his disciples remembered the words of scripture: Zeal for your house will devour me. The Jews intervened and said, 'What sign can you show us to justify what you have done?' Jesus answered, 'Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up'. The Jews replied, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this sanctuary: are you going to raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the sanctuary that was his body, and when Jesus rose from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the words he had said.

During his stay in Jerusalem for the Passover many believed in his name when they saw the signs that he gave, but Jesus knew them all and did not trust himself to them; he never needed evidence about any man; he could tell what a man had in him.

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# Breaking Open the Word

# CHRIST, THE POWER AND WISDOM OF GOD

The image of a limp, distorted body on the cross, which we know as the crucifix, has a long history of development. While its central place with the altar in our churches and its focus for personal devotion may seem normal to us, it is an anathema to others. How is this the focus of our belief and worship? A reminder of the sacrifice, its very presence points to the resurrection, salvation and the hope of everlasting life with God who loves us.

Today's readings grapple with this dilemma. Paul's words to the Corinthians capture something of the complexity of those early days of preaching the Good News: "preaching a crucified Christ." Who would believe in a dead Messiah? Yet Paul insists "but to those who are called, Jews and Gentiles, a Christ who is the power and wisdom of God" (1 Cor 1:24). Paul's tussle with this is juxtaposed with John's account of Jesus cleansing the Temple where Jesus says, "Destroy this sanctuary and in three days I will raise it up" (John 2:19). This imagery made no sense to the Judeans for this Temple, the Holy of the Holies and dwelling place of God took 46 years to build. The narrator adds that the temple Jesus spoke of was his own body. The narrator also recounts that the disciples had heard Jesus' words but it made no sense to them either until the event of the resurrection. Let us contemplate Christ as the power and wisdom of God.
