THE SAVING WORD

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT / B

10 MARCH 2024

FIRST READING

2 Chron 36: 14-16, 19-23

A reading from the second book of Chronicles.

The wrath and the mercy of the Lord are revealed in the exile and liberation of his people.

All the heads of the priesthood, and the people too, added infidelity to infidelity, copying all the shameful practices of the nations and defiling the Temple that the Lord had consecrated for himself in Jerusalem. The Lord, the God of their ancestors, tirelessly sent them messenger after messenger, since he wished to spare his people and his house. But they ridiculed the messengers of God, they despised his words, they laughed at his prophets, until at last the wrath of the Lord rose so high against his people that there was no further remedy.

Their enemies burned down the Temple of God, demolished the walls of Jerusalem, set fire to all its palaces, and destroyed everything of value in it. The survivors were deported by Nebuchadnezzar to Babylon; they were to serve him and his sons until the kingdom of Persia came to power. This is how the word of the Lord was fulfilled that he spoke through Jeremiah, 'Until this land has enjoyed its sabbath rest, until seventy years have gone by, it will keep sabbath throughout the days of its desolation.'

And in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, to fulfil the word of the Lord that was spoken through Jeremiah, the Lord roused the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia to issue a proclamation and to have it publicly displayed throughout his kingdom: "Thus speaks Cyrus king of Persia, "The Lord, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth; he has ordered me to build him a Temple in Jerusalem, in Judah. Whoever there is among you of all his people, may his God be with him! Let him go up."



We are God's work of art, created in Christ Jesus to live the good life as from the beginning he has meant us to live it.

REFLECTION for 4th SUNDAY LENT:

During the seventh century BC, the inhabitants of Jerusalem had moved further and further away from their mission to shine the light of God's holiness, goodness, and majesty on the world. Thus, the light of truth was instead shone then by the invasion of the Babylonians and the destruction of all the signs of the Covenant promises: The Temple, the land and even the royal line, which seemed to be extinguished. God used this desolation and time of exile to enlighten the hearts of his people and enkindle in them the hope of a Saviour, the Messiah, the "Anointed One". The power of God's merciful grace is seen in King Cyrus. After his Persian empire defeated the Babylonians, he allowed and sponsored the exiles to return to Jerusalem. Even more miraculously had the humility to recognize this Gentile as a "Christos" and to publicly acknowledge that they had been so "dead through sin" that only a foreigner, one outside the Covenant, had been able to raise them up. They didn't even attempt to claim the credit. In today's Gospel Jesus challenges us to admit that sometimes we prefer to hide in darkness than to live in the light of truth. Facing the truth

about what is in our hearts. Today requires constant acts of faith, choosing again and again to trust that it is by grace that we have been saved ... not by anything we have done (Ep 2:8). But when we do this, we experience the tremendous freedom of knowing that "God sent his Son into this world not to condemn the world but so that through Him the world might be saved". (Jn 3:17) We have no reason to fear the healing light of Christ. During this Lenen season God desires that we too experience a revival of faith, that we step out of darkness and see with the eves of God. When we make acts of faith in Jesus, in the midst of our daily struggles, this touches Jesus and triggers the divine life of grace in us. We may not feel the effects immediately, but over time it changes the way we think and act. We become aware of God's presence in us, spending time talking to him in prayer, listening quietly for his reply, outpouring his peace into our inner spiritual self. When we have the Lord within us, this brings us joy! We are then able to see all things happening to us as part of his good providence and pleasure. Let us pray. Father, we pray that we may be aware of your Son, Jesus, who wants to give himself to us so that we may grow in holiness and be led to union with you in heaven. Amen.

"DISABLED PARKING BAYS": Parishioners, please remember that the marked bays are provided solely for those who are disabled. It is acknowledged that the bays may not be the desired width. We hope to investigate the matter in due course. The use of the bays is on an honour system,

and I sincerely thank all those who have been mindful of the needs of others. Parishioners who taxi the elderly and disabled are welcome to have their passenger's elite from the mode of transport at the west portico of the church. They may then enter the church through the western glass doors. However, the vehicle must be relocated immediately after the passenger has been settled allowing others to follow. Let us continue to be thoughtful of each other.

CANDELABRA – VOTIVE CANDLES:

Parishioners the tradition of lighting votive candles continues to be a part of our faith tradition. It has been noted that the volume of candles consumed has risen sharply but the monetary donation does not reflect this. A donation of 20c per candle is asked of. This covers the expense to the church for the purchase of each votive candle.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

In 3: 16

Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ! / God loved the world so much, he gave us his only Son, / that all who believe in him might have eternal life. / Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ!

GOSPEL In 3:14-21

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

God sent his Son into the world that we might be saved through him.

Jesus said to Nicodemus:

'The Son of Man must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him. Yes, God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved. No one who believes in him will be condemned; but whoever refuses to believe is condemned already, because he has refused to believe in the name of God's only Son. On these grounds is sentence pronounced: that though the light has come into the world men have shown they prefer darkness to the light because their deeds were evil. And indeed, everybody who does wrong hates the light and avoids it, for fear his actions should be exposed; but the man who lives by the truth comes out into the light, so that it may be plainly seen that what he does is done in God.'

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Breaking Open the Word

GOD'S LOVE, GIFT AND GRACE

On this Laetare Sunday (so called for the first word of the liturgy is "rejoice") we find in the Letter to the Ephesians: "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God" (2:8). To contemplate this statement is to begin to understand the generous mercy and love of God for each of us.

This reading follows 2 Chronicles that recounts the fall of Jerusalem, despite the compassion of God for the people, but then King Cyrus of Persia liberating the exiles. So as the passage begins in Ephesians we see the continuity with God, who is rich in mercy. Three times "grace" is repeated: "by grace you have been saved," "the immeasurable riches of God's grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus" and "for by grace you have been saved through faith." This reiteration accentuates the love of God and invites us to know that "we are God's work of art, created in Christ Jesus for good works."

John's Gospel reminds us "God so loved the world that he gave his only son so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life" (3:16). With his clear illumination of light and darkness, John affirms that "those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."

How will we respond to God's love, gift and grace?
